


History

I can explain crime and punishment in the early modern period




This half-term we have been looking at the history of crime and punishment in Britain. We started off with the Roman times, where the first real organised attempt at punishing crimes in Britain was first introduced. We have then moved through the Anglo Saxon and Viking Periods, through the Norman, medieval and Tudor periods before moving onto the more modern era of Victorian times. This week we have been looking at how more and more crimes were committed from the 17th century onwards, some of this was to do with an ever growing population and some of it due to the fact that the people were getting poorer and more desperate. The children have learnt that in 1688 fifty crimes were punishable by death but by the early 1800's there were over 200 crimes that would receive the death penalty. These included cutting down a small tree, stealing 5 shillings and even damaging Westminster Bridge; the children were shocked. We will finish the unit by looking at the Victorian times and then making comparison with how crime and punishment is dealt with in the 21st century. The children also visited the old Goal house in King's Lynn to see some real life torture devices and learn more about this fascinating subject.
