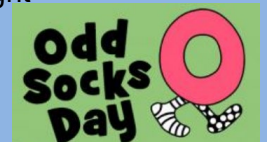

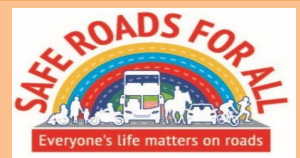

Knife Crime Awareness Week: Joint Enterprise



Operation Sceptre (#operationsceptre) is a National Campaign to target knife related crime by raising awareness amongst communities and to encourage *everyone* to understand the risks and how you can help to reduce these offences and keep people safe. During the Week of Action, which starts **w/c Monday 14th to Sunday 20th November 2022**, or over the coming weeks, your child may receive a presentation in school which highlights the risks and consequences and how they can keep themselves and others safe by reporting any concerns.

There will also be advice, updates and key messages posted via the Cambridgeshire Constabulary Facebook, Twitter and Instagram pages. This year, Cambridgeshire Police will be aiming our focus to raise awareness on **Joint Enterprise**.

Joint Enterprise is a UK LAW that allows more than one person to be charged and convicted of a crime, irrespective of who committed it. What this means is that an individual will be considered as a guilty party of a crime that another person committed where there is sufficient evidence to prove that they were working together or that they had awareness that a crime was intended to occur.

An example of how Joint Enterprise Law works in relation to Knife Crime offences is as follows: if you had knowledge that someone was carrying a knife/ and or other weapon with the intention of committing a crime, but you did nothing to prevent it (such as inform the police/school staff/other authorities), then the court may find you just as guilty as the person committing the crime because of your association with it.

Nitrous Oxide Canisters: Parent and Carers awareness

The use of Nitrous Oxide (NOS) within children and young people is sadly on the increase and therefore we feel it important to share some facts relating to this substance to educate you and your family on the risks and consequences of inhaling it.

Nitrous Oxide is a colourless gas that is commonly found in pressurised metal cannisters and is usually inhaled using a balloon. It is often referred to as laughing gas, balloons, smart whips or NOS.



The risks include: Slowing of body and brain response, headaches and dizziness.

It is more dangerous inhaling directly from the canister as too much NOS can make you feel faint, lose consciousness or suffocate. It can cause spasm of the throat muscle and stop a person from breathing.

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Remain safe this Bonfire night!

Bonfire night can be plenty of fun for all the family to enjoy, but unfortunately it does come with lots of potential hazards, so it is important that you do your best to keep your family safe during this time. The safest way to enjoy the fireworks is to attend an organised firework display instead of holding one at home, this will also help to support your local community.



Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service are very busy this time of year and as such are encouraging everyone to enjoy fireworks responsibly. They are reminding people that fireworks are explosives and as such should be treated with respect and only used in accordance with the manufacturer's instructions and the firework code. If fireworks are mishandled, they can cause injury to people and damage to property.

Whilst fireworks are a tradition for this time of year, please consider the impact the loud noises/ashes can have on animals. Please be courteous and advise any neighbours of your plans (note through the door) so they have time to get their pets inside and try and keep them safe and reassured. Please also remember that lighting bonfires in back gardens present significant risks to residents if they get out of hand.

Did you know?

- It is an offence for anyone under the age of 18 to possess fireworks in public places, and an offence for anyone, other than a firework professional, to possess professional display fireworks
- Police have the power to issue fixed penalty notices to those under the age of 18 caught with fireworks in a public place
- It is illegal to set off fireworks between 11pm and 7am. On November 5th displays can continue until midnight, and on certain occasions, such as New Year's Eve, Diwali, and Chinese New Year, fireworks can be set off until 1am
