PSHE

Most of the lessons involved studying the Anglo-Saxon Legend of Beowulf – which was used as a basis of the work e.g. how to use relative clauses and dialogue. The boys thereafter wrote their own epic tale which they enjoyed tremendously.



Cultural Day – Hannukah

On Wednesday 01.12.2021 students informed about the Hanukkah celebration which is a Jewish festival. They explored the history, traditions and the meaning of Hanukkah and were also engaged in a music lesson related to the Hanukkah celebration and used instruments to recreate traditional music -'Chanukah'. Students created individual stained-glass windows in their art lesson. (Anglia Way). At Sessions House, students used collage then later all their work was put together to show a full stained-glass image of a menorah on a window. The stained-glass window may be seen in some synagogues, which are a Jewish place of worship. Synagogue means to "bring people together". For lunch students enjoyed a buffet of a traditional broccoli pie dish and roasted vegetables.

Cooking – Sessions House

Topic: Health and Safety, Cross Contamination and How to Prevent Food Poisoning

The older group, made cheese potato pie, and students substituted tuna in the mash as they did not like cheese. Skills learnt: boiling and mashing potatoes. Students also baked shortbread, Pudsey cupcakes, sponges and cookies. They all seemed to enjoy making the Pudsey themed cakes as they could experiment in icing and colourings. They also made cheese and onion triangles using paper-based recipe instead of having it written on the board. The younger students made rice crispy cakes, bread and pizza using different toppings, a variety of Pudsey bear cakes and biscuits. They have been learning about the dangers in the kitchen and recognising different foods. All the students have a risk assessment in their folder to pass each task 3 times. I am very pleased to say that 2 students have passed this term so far and have been awarded a certificate. The other students are well on their way to achieving their certificate.
