


Ofsted Outcome

Be Kind Be Brave Be You

It gives me great pleasure to include the outcome from our resent Ofsted inspection in this newsletter.

On 27 - 29 September this term, 4 inspectors landed at the school to see how the school had progressed since the last inspection. They were interested to hear from students and staff about how they felt about the school now, and how much progress students were making in their subjects.



raising standards

When inspecting our curriculum, they recognised that '**pupils feel it meets their needs well'** and that the curriculum had been transformed over the last two years. Pupils have the opportunity to learn a wide curriculum, that prepares them for adulthood through a well planned sixth form.

Inspectors commented that '**personal development of pupils is a strength of the school'**. We are pleased that inspectors agreed with our vision and values, that placing as much importance on pupil's personal and social development as their academic progress, we will truly prepare them for life in modern Britain.

Care inspectors commented that 'children enjoy a broad range of activities', some of which are documented within our newsletters. Furthermore, they noted that 'parents confirmed that the school is continuing to improve. One parent described the school as 'an atmosphere of transparency and it feels more of a family working together".

Inspectors noted that 'children always have someone available to talk to' and this is done through a wide range of supportive strategies.

We as leaders, want to thank the whole school community for their contributions to school during the inspection, and more importantly every day at Grateley House School. The leadership team is now committed to embedding good practice across all areas of the school and will continue to work hard to ensure continued progress towards outstanding.

Virtual London Marathon

Two students here at Grateley House School, with support from the PE Department and inspired by the London Marathon taking place on the 2nd October, organised a Virtual marathon for Grateley House School as part of their Level 2 Diploma in Sports to take place on Friday 30th September.

The aim initially was to run/walk the distance of a Marathon (26.2 miles) between both students and staff around the school premises. Whilst also celebrating Resilience Week

within the school, the organisers of this event decided that during the time of the event - 9.30 to 15.30, that at least one person would be running/walking the course.



After usual Friday morning assembly, all the participants were briefed about the event. Money was also raised for Youth Sport Trust UK - a charity that empower and try to facilitate young people the access to physical activity. We managed to raise the figure of \pounds 30.

At 9.30 with music playing loudly to motivate all staff and

students, all started off by doing a lap together. It was a great example of how we support each other and how students and staff were able to motivate each other to do an extra lap.

At the end of the day, the result was 2 students managed to do the distance of over a half marathon and several staff and students managed to complete over a 10k distance. Totalling an amazing

Post-16 News

Post 16 students have been working hard on the occupational studies course (and AQA unit awards) as part of this term. This has been underpinned by work experience in places such as Enham Trust, The Army Flying Museum and Lockerley Motors in Romsey as well as in the school kitchen at GHS. This has come to a total of almost 200 hours of completed work related learning already in this academic year. We remain committed to beat last years' figure of 601 hours with a provisional target of 750 hours set (with a much smaller cohort, it must be stressed).

For the first time in a number of years the school will have a real Christmas tree in the main hall. This has been hand reared and picked by Felix whilst on his Work Experience with Enham Trust. Multiple year groups will be helping to decorate the tree with a blend of shop bought and hand-crafted decorations as we celebrate the festive season.

Students on site continue to develop their functional living skills in preparation for life after Grateley and adulthood on general with such elements as cooking, budgeting and social skills built into their timetable individually or



collectively within an age appropriate PSHCE programme. A number of post 16 students have completed careers interviews with Hampshire Futures with all to be offered the option of such by the end of the academic year. A selection of year 11 students have already completed college applications for 2022 - 2024 and we will support them for every step of this process.

Those students engaging in college study programmes, this year, are doing well with an overall attendance percentage of 86%. Courses range from levels 1 to 3 (in Vehicle Maintenance, ICT, Business, Psychology, Criminology, Sport and Chemistry) with engagement and being up to date with their coursework confirmed by recent termly overview reports. Close support is ongoing for all those students on the college / GHS hybrid model.

Messages to Ukraine

Pupils were worried about the Russian invasion of Ukraine. During this school year, we were privileged to have had a visit from one of the Ukrainian refugees who had come to the UK as a result, a student called Kira. She described how



life was before the war and how everyone's lives were suddenly turned upside down.

Pupils participated in writing messages to Ukrainian soldiers. It was heart warming to know that our messages were very much appreciated.

This appreciation took the form of a reply, complete with some photographs, received from injured soldiers (with faces obscured for security reasons, but

smiles clearly evident), convalescing in hospital, forwarded by a

member of our local Ukrainian community!

people across the UK to rebuild their lives was outstanding to see!




Subject News - ICT / iMedia

This term, year 7 have been exploring photoshop and using photoshop to talk about saving our world. Eden based her work around frogs, inspired by 'froggie'. More recently, year 7 have been focusing on computer architecture and understanding the difference between input and output devices.

Year 9 have focused on a few areas of ICT this term. They began with understanding and writing their own python. Courtnall created a scripted testing the users on their timetables. He tested this on a number of staff members. Well done Courtnall!



In the last few weeks, the year 9s have been created a website using HTML. Courtnall is focusing his website on penguins.

Trophies for the first 3 teams were given and diplomas for all the participants, but most importantly, it was great to see students enjoying the opportunity to be competitive and collaborative within a team as well as engaging positively in their personal and physical development.



Student Work - Art

In Year 9 Art this term we have been looking at mythical creatures. Observing animals and humans that are combined in myths and legends and creating some of our own. Courtnall has been working on improving his observational drawing to begin his creature- a cross with a man and a penguin.



We have explored proportions and measurements to ensure that our drawings are accurate. Courtnall began with a drawing of a man and then one of a penguin. Courtnall has developed his tonal shading and colour blending skills and used his drawings to create a plan to make a 3D model using wire, foil and mod roc.



Student Work - PE

Carter is studying Developing sporting skills and tactical awareness unit as part of his Level 2 Sports Diploma. This learning will provide Carter to develop his understanding of technical and tactical skills for a sport of his choice. As he has chosen Football there is an opportunity to assess and analyse his own skills, along with the analysis to his teachers and a professional sports person. With this analysis, he will be able develop a plan to improve their football performance within the technical and tactical side.

1 Understand the technical and tactical skills for a selected sport

Explain the importance of understanding the technical and tactical skills for a sport

A skill is an ability to do something well consistently, but this does need practise

A technique is the way you perform a skill, two players may do the same skill but might have different techniques

A tactic is the mental side of sports going on the attack or playing defence

It is important to know and understand technical and tactical skills to know your advantages and where to position yourself to play well and you need to know them to teach others skill

Identify the different ways skills can be classified.

Continuous skills you do all the time like running

Discrete skills are a single skill in a series making up an action. Example: rolling the ball up your leg in a rainbow flick in football

Serial skills are a combination of discreate skills like in triple jump its running jumping then landing

For a selected sport explain the essential: • technical skills • tactical skills Football:

1. Technical skills

Passing is the ability to move the ball to another player without stopping

Shooting and finishing is one if not the most important skills in football and you need power and accuracy to do this successfully Dribbling is the most used skill in amateur football and it requires agility and control while moving the ball

Heading (I don't think that's the official word) you can score, pass and steal the ball with this skill it requires a forehead of steel and no flinch reaction

2. Tactical skills

Attacking With and without possession of the ball

Ball control: the ability to control the ball quickly, smoothly and consistently Penetrating/peripheral vision: being able to spot an opening in the enemies play to attack Combination patterns: to look for opportunities to play combination patterns without looking for open space. To be able to read a situation to know to give close support or to stay away Knowing when to push forward with perfect timing to meet the ball at a location

<u>Defending</u>

Regain possession of the ball Knowing when to intercept passes with good timing Knowing when to mark players to force mistakes Knowing when, how and where to tackle Knowing to Contain attacking players until support arrives VERBAL FEEDBACK GIVEN – This a good piece of work Carter! 1.3. explained in depth the importance of understanding the technical and tactical skills for football

Safeguarding Topic - Online safety tips for parents

Our modern-day cyber world continues to pose new risks for our young people. Parents are often not as tech savvy as their children and thus it is good to be aware of some pointers to help keep your children safe online during this holiday period.

Apps

These can be a positive way for young people to socialise and many of them have a wide array of apps. Some of these apps allow social networking and image sharing as well as instant messaging. Some like YouTube, provide creative opportunities. There are many positives to be gained from using them but like all online activity these apps can also pose dangers for our young people.

Some safety tips for parents to consider in regard to safe app use are:

- Check the privacy settings and age relevance of the apps your child is using.
- Talk to your child about the content they share online and
- Discuss with them the consequence of sharing messages and images online.

Gaming

Gaming is a fun activity for many young people and for some it can even become all consuming. Some things to consider if you child is an avid gamer are:

- Make sure they use the gaming consoles' safety settings.
- Agree with your child regarding the time spent on line.
- Pay attention to the PEGI ratings.
- Remember that some games have inbuilt chat functions. Try and keep and eye on who your child is chatting with.
- Be aware of any behavioural or emotional changes in your child after spending time gaming that might raise concerns about who they are communicating with.
- Be aware that your child may use servers or 3rd party applications to access interactives online communities. Again, be aware of any emotional or behavioural changes that suggest concern.
