Recycling sessions enable students to develop independence skills within a safe environment. Students are required to follow routine organisational instructions to prepare for the session and are expected to complete the process of visiting various recycling points around the college to collect the recyclable items. Students are then encouraged to recycle the rubbish in the correct bins. Together we have created this recycling awareness display which is made up of items which we have collected in our recycling sessions. Our aim is to make our students more aware of the positive effects recycling has on our planet and continue to fight for change!

Education Update

"The students have been engaging in a range of learning activities linked to the key Quality of Life themes. This includes 'my community', 'my safety' and 'my self-care', amongst others. The new students have been learning the routines of Forest School and making progress in problem solving and communication by completing tasks in preparing the Forest School furniture. Students have started to explore the world of work in the local community and now take party in a weekly session at the community café, as well as working in the local Cycle Hub where they have started working as part of the team, repairing and servicing bikes".



Staff Training

This month our staff have participated in Makaton

Level 1, and Level 2 training with support of a Makaton Tutor. Our staff have been provided with information about what Makaton is and have been taught signs and symbols from the core vocabulary

which is needed for everyday communication. Additional training has been provided to our staff regarding our online system, **Databridge**. Training focused on how we can manage student and staff records alongside ILR (Individual Learning Credit) student submissions. Lastly, safeguarding training has been issued to staff which breaks down the

appropriate courses of action to take and the knowledge needed to appropriately report abuse and neglect.
