

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

School Steam Project

Over the past year, AF and I have engaged in dedicated lessons focused on the repair and renovation of model steam engines. We typically acquire these engines online, often in less than optimal condition, with ages ranging from 50 to 80 years old per engine. After restoring each engine, we perform safety tests using compressed air before operating them on solid fuel. Both AF and I fabricate the necessary accessories using retro Meccano or by designing them in Tinkercad. Followed by 3D printing on the school 3D printer. A future project, inspired by AF, will involve operating a record turntable powered by steam, utilizing gears to achieve the correct speed. Meanwhile, we are also working on a vintage drilling machine as we gather the necessary components for the steam project. These endeavours not only provide valuable life skills such as soldering but also deepen AF's understanding of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM).


Archery






Over the course of the half term we have been able to welcome Dave Oxenham from Leap-of-Faith to school every other Friday. Dave has been helping develop additional outdoor education experiences for our students in partnership with our existing outdoor education department. Dave was recently able to run a morning of Archery sessions for students in the school sports hall. During these sessions students were taught safety sequences and key skills required within archery. Students were also taught the official scoring system and were then challenged to a competitive shoot off against both Dave and other staff members. The students involved posted some amazing scores and also showcased an exceptional level of patience and understanding throughout the entire session. Dave is looking forward to creating further sessions for the students over the coming weeks.





CM has recently been researching and creating a new geocaching course both within the school grounds and out in the wider community. CM has been researching geocaching as part of his Outdoor Activities modules of the Cambridge Nationals Level 1/2 Sports Studies course. After initially discovering that geocaching is "a bit like a treasure hunt but nearer really", CM has been out in our local community using the Geocaching® app to discover previously created locations. CM discovered that our local community has a limited number of locations with a limited level of challenge. He has subsequently been able to design and position a series of new locations for our students to discover over the next few months. The task has enabled CM to develop his understanding of ways to promote activity in people via small challenges and will help him in his future course work in the subject. The Geocaching app can be found on both Apple and Google app stores and offers a good level of free locations with its free and basic sign up. Geocaching can be used as a great activity to help encourage inquisitive students become more active.



Coates Willow Centre Trip





The trip to Coates English Willow Centre was much enjoyed by three students on Thursday 19th September, accompanied by Jodie and Henrietta. This local business grows willow and uses this natural material to create baskets, caskets and it has a rich history which now includes selling charcoal around the world. We saw the growing, drying, stripping and making with the willow, the museum and an explanatory film. We were shown around by Nicola who was a fantastic guide and showed the processes and creation of different products, people and machines involved. The students have written a thank you card to Nicola

This trip was especially organised to see how to make a Guardsman's Bearskin for MB and he is making great progress in its construction.





Okehampton Castle Visit

On Tuesday 8th October, ASF, BP, C, LP and SC travelled with Mel and Phil to visit Okehampton Castle.

To start with, we explored the castle grounds using the audio tour as our guide. We started by the entrance and finished up on the top of the motte at the keep. The pupils were challenged to find the Norman toilet and LP was the first to spot it, which simply consisted of a chute that guided people's waste outside of the building – yuck!





After getting a good idea of the grounds, SC and C thought it might be fun to find out what it would have been like to try and attack the keep by climbing the motte – the huge earth mound that the keep sat atop. Black History Month

Barrack Obarna

1st black President of the USA



Background

- Barack was born on August 4, 1961.
- Obama was born in Honolulu
- His mother was from Hawaii and father from Kenya
- He graduated from Columbia University in 1983 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in political science
- He worked as a community organizer in Chicago
- 1988, Obama enrolled in Harvard Law School, where he became the first black president of the Harvard Law

How he became President

Before winning the presidency, Obama represented Illinois in the U.S. Senate (2005–08). He was the third African American to be elected to that body since the end of Reconstruction (1877).

On August 27 Obama became the first African American to be nominated for the presidency by either major party and went on to challenge Republican Sen. John McCain for the country's highest office.

Why was this so important?

He became the first African American President of the USA in 2008

Other achievements

He was awarded the Nobel peace prize

In 2009 he was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize "for his extraordinary efforts to strengthen international diplomacy and cooperation between peoples."





Black History Month


Martin Luther King


During world war2 the Tuskegee airmen were the first black airman to fight in world war 2. Almost 1,000 Black men were trained at the Tuskegee army air field.

They were the most effecting Bomber assist unit out of the entire U.S air force of ww2. Hence, they were recorded for the least number of lost pilots, compared to the rest of the U.S air force.

Until...

Chickenpox	at least 5 days from the onset of the rash and until all blisters have crusted over	
Diarrhoea and Vomiting	48 hours after their last episode	
Cold and Flu-like illness (including COVID-19)	they no longer have a high temperature and feel well enough to attend. Follow the national guidance if they've tested positive for COVID-19.	
Impetigo	their sores have crusted and healed, or 48 hours after they started antibiotics	
Measles	4 days after the rash first appeared	
Mumps	5 days after the swelling started	
Scabies	they've had their first treatment	
Scarlet Fever	24 hours after they started taking antibiotics	
Whooping Cough	48 hours after they started taking antibiotics
