This year, once again, the whole of the school community were involved in our fantastic sports day. The weather was a little on the hot side for athletics, however, all pupils, staff and parents became fully engaged with the activities on the sports field. In the morning the field events took place and the students competed with intensity achieving 7 gold standards, outstanding performers were Kieran Meadows, Harvey Rogers, Louie Lauder and Cameron Hopkins in the discus, Lewis Stratton, Miles Stephenson and Kieran Meadows in the shotput, Cameron Hopkins, Harvey Rogers and Alex Adams in the Cricket Ball throw. In the afternoon the track events took place alongside numerous fun activities, with the grand finale tug of war which was won by the Royals. Sweat, guts and tears and excellent determination were on display and the parents enjoyed watching their children participate. A further 8 gold standards were achieved and outstanding performers were Cameron Hopkins, Jordan Harrison, Alfie Ricci and Paulie Lewis who all achieved at least one gold standard each. The Knights went on to win the House Trophy.



Attendance at Potterspury – an improving picture!

School attendance at Potterspury Lodge has improved steadily over the course of this term. We have increased our overall percentage this term from 78.11% to 85.17% - which is absolutely fantastic. We also have a number of students who have been gradually improving their attendance week on week.

Year 11 Presentation at Sponne School

As Tutors, we have been very proud of our Year 11s. Our boys have worked very hard all year for their GCSE and Functional Skills exams, and we believe that they all gave of their very best in every exam.

Several boys have exceeded expectations during the year and have involved themselves in Presentations.

Lucas, Nathaniel and Chris produced a wonderful Presentation on the theme of DIVERSITY, which they gave to the whole school during an assembly in February.

Following the opening of the new building after Christmas Nathaniel and Lucas further developed this theme of Diversity. They worked on a presentation, giving names to each room in the building, and naming the building itself: Malala (after the Nobel Prize-winning champion of girls' education).

They gave their Powerpoint Presentation first to Mr Munday-Webb, then to the Management Team, and subsequently to the Directors and even to OFSTED, who commented:

"... pupils ... develop their independence and leadership skills. The Year 11 pupils are rightly proud of the reputation they enjoy as mature and sensible young people who are good role models for others. As one explained, 'Everything we touch turns to gold!'"

Most of the Year 11s then became immersed in the philosophical question: "Is it a sandwich?" (a Subway? An Oreo biscuit?), and once again Lucas and Nathaniel canvassed the students and once again they successfully presented their finding during an assembly.

The GCSEs intervened during May and June, but during the July Transition period towards Post 16, the students were encouraged to develop a presentation for another school with the brief: "What is it like to have Autism?"


Lucas came up with this introductory screen, and the name "Autopsy". Bravely, the team stuck with it throughout!

Nathaniel and Lucas were joined by Kieran for this task. They started from scratch and then spent several days refining and practising their presentation, which improved greatly from the time and care the students gave to the task.

On a Tuesday in July they went down to Sponne comprehensive school in Towcester, and delivered their presentation, unscripted, to the entire Year 8 group there. It was a pleasure and a privilege to witness, as was evidenced by the children clapping once, out of custom, and then again in warm congratulation of the achievement of our very successful Year 11s.



Assessment



ALL CHANGE!

We are in the process of revising the way that we assess, track and monitor the progress of all students at CPLS. In addition to the annual spelling and reading comprehension assessments (these will be coming home with your child's annual report) we will be making the subject assessment system more robust. This means that students will complete one formally assessed piece of work each half-term in each subject. We will then be able to ensure that interventions are in place to support students when they need it.

We will also be moving to assessing students against the new numbered GCSE grades. Sitting below GCSE grades 1-9, will be grades F1-F9. This means that students will be able to clearly see their own progress, whatever level they are working at. It is essential that students feel a sense of pride in their academic achievements at school.

An update of awesome work!

Since returning from the half term the students have been busy working on various projects. The Primary class have been looking at Mexican weaving and have been creating woven fabric themselves. The project has been combined with colour theory; the students have looked at the colour wheel, warm and cool colours and analogous colours. The class have produced some beautifully woven fabric and have taken care over the presentation of their work.



Year 7 and 8 have been working on a project based on recreating landscapes, they have looked at some art movements and work by Vincent van Gogh, Grant Wood and Wendy Dolan. Final outcomes for this project have included working with mixed media and felt. The students showed great precision and perseverance when recreating their drawings using string.











Year 9 have researched masks based on the theme Dream World and designed their own masks, before going on to make their designs in clay. Their sketchbooks show clear development of ideas and the themes have included boxing, ideal worlds and religious symbols. The students have used a range of techniques in their work and have produced colourful and eye-catching work.

Year 10 have continued work on the theme Dream World, students have developed this theme with their own ideas. Areas of interest have included symbols, power buildings and railway patterns. The students have explored these themes in interesting and imaginative ways, outcomes have included painting, drawing and different types of printing.





The classes have worked hard this year and have produced a good variety of interesting work that has shown their progress. I look forward to seeing the students in the new academic year and continuing to see their work develop.

SCIENCE UPDATE

The year began with a transitioning to a new examination. Instead of the AQA curriculum students pursued the Edexcel course for the new GCSE 9-1. I believe this exam is more appropriate for the students both in terms of its language of assessment and the rigour in interrogation of scientific knowledge and application which are more suited to our cohort of students. Additionally, the Entry Level Certificate (ELC) in Science was introduced to give students an option as well as the possibility of gaining another or a qualification in science.

In Keystage 3 students also were preparing for the new challenges of the 9-1 GCSE and as such began that journey admirable with most students engaging in the topics and making reasonable progress. Year 8s studied biology in the first semester which included the topics food and digestion and microbes and diseases. In semester 2 chemistry was the subject and atoms, elements, compounds and mixtures were the topics engaged.

The year 7s also studied biology, chemistry and physics in each of the terms and the topics included cells: using the microscope, the environment, acids and alkalis and energy resources. The year 9s started their GCSE studies and the quest for knowledge included interrogating inheritance and selection, health, reactions of metals energy and gravity and space.

The final term will see years 7, 8 and 9 students completing chemistry and physics projects to further enhance their research skills, appreciation of the scientific method and application of scientific principles studied throughout the year.

Careers at Potterspury Lodge!

As per our last newsletter, Careers Education at Potterspury Lodge has got off to a flying start!

This term we have put together a Careers and Transition Programme for our students in Year 10, 11 and Post 16. As well as taking part in work experience placements, students have been involved in a number of careers related sessions.

During the first two weeks in July, we invited a Youth Liaison Officer in from Moulton College who delivered sessions on transitioning for college. Students had the opportunity to explore and discuss different college courses and look at the various pathways that would enable them to access these courses. Students took part in careers sessions delivered by Moulton College, which allowed students to develop their interview and entrepreneurial skills.

As part of this programme, we also put on various sessions led by Potterspury Lodge staff, including CV writing and job search workshops and an interview speed-dating session. Students engaged and participated really well in these sessions and were able to talk confidently and professionally about themselves and their relevant experiences. Our Careers Advisor, Mr Clifford also completed Careers Action Plans with all of our Year 10, 11 and Post 16 students, which we will continue to add to next academic year.

We visited Rushden Academy for their Careers Fayre where our students had the opportunity to speak to various different local employers, apprenticeship providers, colleges and universities. Students also participated in school and college visits at various locations.

We look forward to sharing our Careers Plan for next year with you and for students to continue students' forward thinking.
