Each year we ask the students to vote on a local charity showing we have an understanding and see value in our community and a national charity to support, so who did we vote for this year?

About our chosen charities:

Mind is a mental health charity in England and Wales. Founded in 1946 as the National Association for Mental Health, it celebrated its 70th anniversary in 2016. Mind offers information and advice to people with mental health problems and lobbies government and local authorities on their behalf.



Willen Hospice is a registered charity that provides specialist care for people whose illness no longer responds to curative treatment (also known as specialist palliative care).

We provide care for people from the age of 18 years upwards and work in Milton Keynes and the surrounding areas. Willen Hospice provides services to three Primary Care Trusts - Milton Keynes, Bedfordshire and Northamptonshire. The Hospice is based at a quiet lakeside area close to the City Centre.

HISTORY



Things are as busy as ever in the history department! Most of our Year 11 students have been learning about the Vikings with their fascinating beliefs about Valhalla, Valkyries and Odin; many students have spotted characters that appear in the Marvel films and village scenes from Fortnight, showing how the lure of Viking legend endures. Our Year 10s have been finding out about Hitler and the growth of the Nazi Party from its tiny origins after the First World War. We have also discovered why Hitler had to shorten his moustache when he was a soldier and which tunes he whistled when he was relaxed! For Year 9, the Black Death has dominated along with some interesting medieval approaches to curing it – including inhaling the fumes from a bucket of sewage for half an hour a day! <u>RPG</u>

Friday afternoons for some students is spent far away from Potterspury, in the (imaginary) city of Kaer Maga, where vampires are battled and the skeletons are scared to – well - undeath.

This is an open-ended heroic role playing game (RPG) in which everyone creates and inhabits a self-generated character. The students then act as a team to pit their wits and skills against the adversaries that they encounter as the story unravels, as told by one of the older players.

Evidently, a core of students have caught the role-playing bug. They meet to play every Friday, as well as Tuesday and Thursday evening after school.

As an end-of-term treat, students organised themselves for an all-day session, and decorated the classroom in suitably gothic fashion.

Why I have developed RPG gaming at PLS

I am neither a psychologist nor a therapist, but I see the gains that the students make when they play these games, and in most cases, so do their parents.

They gain confidence and social cohesion, they affirm their imaginations and they practice communication in an environment where negotiation with a potential enemy can be more potent than an (imaginary) blow.

They can dare to gamble with a ogre or even jump on a dragon to risk death or untold glory. They can engage in a narrative which is completely liberating because it is also preposterous... and it is a narrative that is written by them and their interactions as much as by the "games-master".

These students may already be too old and too intelligent to engage with play-therapy, but when the play-leader appears to be a-bit-of-a-nerd who appears motivated only by the fun of the game, they are perhaps a little more likely to let their inhibitions go and they become immersed in a game which thrives on its absurdity.

RPG is not for everybody. In fact it is patently not even for the majority of our students, but for about 8-10 students over the last 2 years, it may have been the most fun they have had at school... and the best therapy.
