expand if enough students take advantage of the offer.




Primary Update:

Year 4

We have had another hardworking, busy term in Year 4. We have been continuing to build our confidence and asking for help. Reading has been a part of our days and we have read two Horrible History books about World War 1 and World War 2, we have also read a Marvel book about Ant-Man. We have been doing art where we have been learning about pointillism – this is a tiring method of art but we enjoyed making our own creations!



In English we have been working really hard. We have covered lots of topics; report writing, compound words, adventure stories, advertisements, persuasive writing, poems and playscripts. After reading The Hodgeheg, we got to make our own compound words for animals - our favourites we created were jillyfesh and worthag! We have written adverts for existing and new products – Harvey has some great ideas for products (you might get scammed though!). When learning




about plays, we are able to explain what the features of a play are and the


importance of adverbs in them - how else will the actors know what to do?

In Maths, we have been doing more work on our addition, subtraction, multiplication and division. We find

multiplication and division quite tricky but we are getting there. We have been using different methods for addition and our favourite is the column method. Sequences were tricky to begin with but the more work we did on them, the easier they got – we were able to say what the sequence was without help! We have also been learning how to add and subtract money using place value which we know will help us when we are older! 2D and 3D shapes have been fun to learn about – we can recall the properties of lots of different shapes. We have even been learning about symmetry – we found this quite tricky but persevered with it. Recently we have been learning how to tell the time which has helped us a lot – especially to know when lunch is!







In Science we have learnt about the states of matter. We really enjoyed being the particles in solids, liquids and gasses, especially in gasses as they bounce around everywhere! We are also able to explain how water changes state – when it freezes it turns to a solid then when it melts it turns back into a liquid and when it evaporates it becomes a gas. We have also been learning about sound where we can explain that it is energy and is caused by vibrations. We can explain what pitch and volume are and had great fun finding different sounds in the classroom – we especially liked making the loud sounds!

In Topic we have learned about Crime and Punishment. We have looked at the changes in crime and punishment from 1066 all the way up until today! Did you know that women were allowed to become police officers in 1914? Learning about the different roles in a courtroom was interesting – we enjoyed acting out our own courtroom and sending people to prison! Our other Topic that we have been learning about is The Rainforest. We

have learnt a lot about the different animals and how they are suited to live there. Our favourite was the dart-frog. We liked this because it is small, red and black – oh and it is poisonous!

We have had a busy year and have worked really hard. We are looking forward to summer and we hope that everyone else has a wonderful summer too!

Year 5



In the KS2 department we have continued to develop our understanding across a wide range of subject and topic areas during the Summer Term 2023. In English we have been consolidating all of our knowledge and skills we have learnt over the academic year with students stating "World War 2 was my favourite topic' and 'I really enjoyed Goodnight Mister Tom'.

In Mathematics we have been looking at converting units, decimals, measurement, negative numbers and maths investigations. Some comments from students - "I loved the mermaid maths investigation. We had to do the



maths to find the clues as to who made the mermaid sculptures. It was really fun! and 'I really liked negative numbers, I found them really easy and I enjoyed the harder questions".



As part of our Topic curriculum, we have been looking at 'Marvellous'. Through this topic we have looked at mountains from around the world, learnt about contour lines, discovered how mountains are created, and used the internet to find out the names of the largest mountain in each continent. We have even calculated the contour lines of a potato!

Scientifically, we have studied Forces and Animals including Humans. During our Forces topic we discovered facts about Newton and the Laws that he created, looked at parachutes, discovered why friction is so important and investigated drag, up-thrust and buoyancy!





In addition to the above work we have tried our hands at drawing feathers, plants and flowers; expanded our French conversational and geographical skills; looked at how diverse Britain is and how the way in which we see ourselves and treat others can impact on our life; researched how different religions 'forgive'.



During our PE lessons we have tried to get outside as much as possible. We have improved our badminton skills, completed the PLS orienteering course and even used Pokémon Go! to help us become even better orienteers.

This has been a really exciting year in Primary for both students and staff, especially as we have



doubled in size. It's been an amazing year all round and we wish all students a safe and happy summer and look forward to welcoming everyone back in September.

Subject Updates:

English

Year 7s have been working hard consolidating their spelling, punctuation and grammar skills in addition to their daily handwriting practice.

We have also been practising the following text types: Information Text /Story Writing / Letter Writing / Story Telling / Writing Information Text / Recount and have had the opportunity to explore text from 'Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone'.

The students have worked incredibly hard and are ready to begin their next academic year as year 8s!

The past few months have been both busy and exciting in the subject of English. In Year 8, students have studied the modern world-literature classic 'Annie John' - a highly engaging book which supported the transition into the next unit, Creative Writing Memoir. The final unit of the year has been the classic Shakespearian tragedy 'Julius Caesar', a text through which students are able to combine linguistic analysis with their learning of interesting historical detail.

Year 9 students have undertaken an in-depth study of the classic 19th century novel 'Jane Eyre', covering a range of interesting focus areas such as proto-feminist themes, character evaluation and language analysis. Students are currently concluding their studies of the classic gothic mystery 'Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde'.

Our Year 10 students have re-dedicated themselves to their studies with a renewed focus, revising in detail for their recent mock examinations while also engaged in the detailed study of the AQA power and conflict poetry collection. The determination exhibited by these students as the academic year has drawn to a close has been a shining example to younger students.

Forest School

This year in Forest School, students have learned a variety of survival skills including shelter building, lighting fires and navigation. They have also continued to maintain the gardens and have chosen a number of plants to grow, including chilli peppers and pumpkins that should be ready in time for Halloween!

The enterprise students' project this year successfully raised £150 for the Bus Shelter MK. They have completed their portfolio and have been looking at life skills including CV and cover letter writing to begin to prepare them for the world of employment.

Geography

The summer term unit in Geography combined the coastal features with the RNLI (Royal National Lifeboat Institution) based water safety awareness course. On the course, students learned about the dangers of rips, submerged objects, RNLI flag meanings, and how to stay safe around rivers, lakes and oceans. Most importantly, all students were given over two hours of informative training and practical assessments on CPR and Dr's ABC. All students were able to demonstrate how to give rescue breaths and compressions on our CPR dolls.



In addition, to coincide with the weather unit this term, several year 7 and 8 students were lucky enough to visit the Turweston Aerodrome for a private tour of the landing tower and all of the equipment that is used on site. Students had the opportunity to observe up close all of the meteorological and aviation equipment that is required to help land the planes and while there, they got to see several take-off and landings happen.



In addition, students were surprised to see Colin McRae's racing car testing its new engine on the runway between landings and take-offs.

History



Another fun term in history has seen our Year 7s and 8s learning about the English Civil War, in which Englishmen fought Englishmen. They have considered issues such as: should we be taxed and should we have a say in how our country is run? Some have taken part in role

is the idea created by Dale Collier, and to the right, a vision created by Sophie Burridge.




Our Year 9s have completed their study of medicine in the British trenches of the First World War, finding out about the impact of manure in the soil on open wounds, the high death toll caused by broken legs and the necessity of having a live human donor to give blood to an injured soldier at the start of the war. Some students have taken part in role playing injuries and evacuation from the trenches as well as gruesome surgery through the ages! Year 10 have all but completed their study of Elizabethan England, finding out about English success at sea against the Spanish and the beginnings of what would later become the British Empire – the start of turning England from a small and insignificant country into a leading power in the world. The students have worked hard and deserve a good break now!
